- 1. Welcome and Introductions
 - a. Each member introduced themself and said how they were connected to the school
- 2. Purpose of SIAC
 - a. Erin explained the purpose of SIAC and that it is:

Purpose of the committee is to make recommendations for school improvement to the Board about the following components

- 1. Major educational needs
- 2. Student learning goals
- 3. Long range goals that include, but are not limited to, the state indicators that address reading, mathematics and science achievement
- 4. Bullying and harassment prevention goals
- 3. School Improvement

a. 5-Year Strategic Plan - Erin shared the 5-year strategic plan with the committee and how it was developed with data from ISASP, Conditions for Learning, Post-Secondary Reports, Iowa School Performance Profile, and Chronic Absenteeism reports. The four big rocks on the plan cover Culture, Workforce, MTSS, and Future Ready.

b. Data Exploration

- i. Teams broke off to explore data from one topic ELA, math, science, chronic absenteeism, conditions for learning, and post-secondary reports.
- ii. Teams discussed strengths, weaknesses, questions, and ideas for improvement
- iii. Teams shared out to the whole group what they discussed.
 - 1. Conditions for learning strengths were student to student relationships and adult to student relationships in the elementary. HS increased in percentage for boundaries and expectations. Weaknesses include: Emotional Safety being below avg and student to student relationships below average in the HS. Questions: How can we support our students within each area? What are the reasons our kids don't feel emotionally safe? Ideas include: PBIS supports for our students and building stronger relationships with families.
 - 2. Chronic Absenteeism Strengths: Parents are aware, tight knit school, we know who's missing. Weaknesses: Students with IEP's and F/R lunch demographics have the highest rates of absenteeism. Questions: What is the correlation between student grades and absenteeism. Ideas for improvement: Incentivize attendance, peer to peer tutoring, showing more visuals and the impact CA has on students.

- 3. ELA Strengths: Went from 61%-69% overall, 5 grades are above 72%, 3 other grades are in line with state avg, 10th is above state avg.

 Weaknesses: 5th & 9th are at 58%, 4 grades are below 70%, A class went down from 67% to 58%

 We are not at 80%. Questions: What was the cause of the large jumps in some classes? How ccan we sustain this growth and get to 80%. Ideas for improvement: Continue implementation of new ELA curriculum, keep alignment of standards with state testing, continue to align interventions and strengthen MTSS, strengthen teacher knowledge of Science of Reading
- 4. Math & Science Strengths: Showing improvement in both subject areas overall. Weaknesses: reaching and sustaining 80%. Needing a stronger start with our 5th graders in science. Questions: Is there consistent growth 3rd-11th? Are we doing the right thing by providing fewer minutes of sci instead through 6th grade? Ideas for improvement: Send practice work home, prepare for the time when FOSS science kits are no longer an option.
- 5. Post-Secondary Strengths: Current trend looks better 96% projected instead of 90%. Weaknesses: Buy-in from students and parents, enrollment, attendance, post-secondary interest. Questions: What % of non-graduates are 5-year and drop-outs? What options of support to keep kids moving do we need to continue to explore? Ideas for improvement: Visual Freshmen communication, Explain Kirkwood opportunities (in-house, course fair, career fair), More education on work-place learning

 - i. Greatest areas of need selected by the committee include: conditions for learning, chronic absenteeism, and ELA

Recommendations for the school board from the SIAC Committee:

- 1. Plan for district-wide implementation/refinement of Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)
- 2. Prioritize relationships with families through our new positions at the middle school and high school.
- 3. Address chronic absenteeism by providing peer-to-peer tutoring, incentivizing attendance, and bringing more visuals into our awareness campaign.
- 4. Continue to prioritize 80% proficiency on all benchmarks
- 5. Strengthen our multi-tier system of support and align interventions in ELA, provide training opportunities for teachers in the science of reading, and continue our K-6 ELA curriculum while aligning standards to state testing.
